Systematic Botany Workshops (Sys-bot Lite)

Systematic botany is the process through which by understanding plant structure botanists are able to place plants within families, genera, species, and varieties or subspecies. It is nothing mystical, given the correct information most people will find themselves able to utilize this process to identify the majority of the plants they encounter. This is not the memorization of individual species; it is learning how to utilize observation skills and plant keys to arrive at species identification. A rose may smell as sweet regardless of name, but knowing whether the rose is *Rosa nutkana* or *woodsii* may prove useful. These workshops will be highly participatory. Maximum benefit will be achieved by coupling the workshops with the upcoming field trips (see our calendar). Workshop participants will be encouraged to make collections (these can be physical, photographic, written or ??) and engage in projects that will further the participants knowledge of botany and also help further Idaho's knowledge of native plants. The first class is August 1st! The class will go for 10+ weeks, offer college credit, and be BIG FUN with instructors from the US Forest Service, ID Fish and Game and Conservation Seeding and Restoration, Inc.
